CLOUD OF WAR AGAIN LOWERS OVER BALKANS

Revolutionary Regime Will Not Stop Agrarians, Say European Diplomats.

KING IS ON THRONE

Youthful Boris Figurehead With Name But Impotent Is General Belief.

(By the Associated Press) LONDON, June 10.—No event since the Greek convulsion of last October has raised such apprehension in the minds of the foreign statesmen regarding the future stability of the Balkan states as the Bulgarian revolution.

Some observers fear the present episode may lead to civil war. In such an eventuality, they point out, the Bulgarian army would be helpless to cope with the situation, as it is merely a police organization of a few thousand men.

Three o'clock in the morning, when all Sofia was asleep and when Premier Stamboulsky was absent in the country, was chosen as the hour for the launching of the coup d'etat.

Although no news has been received here regarding King Boris, it is assumed that he remains on the throne. Friends of the youthful monarch say that he never at heart has sympathized with the agrarian movement.

Reigns But Impotent. "You shall reign, but you shall not govern," Stamboulsky is reported to have told the king not long ago, and to have added "you are king, not of the parties but of the working people."

BILL EDWARDS, former Tulsa university football hero, became another kind of hero Sunday. He rescued a family floating down the Salt Fork.

Colonel Joe Miller is using a rowboat to travel from the 101 ranch store to the White House, ranch manse. The distance is approximately 100 yards.

Higher flood stage than at any time this season is expected in Oklahoma City by Wednesday night or Thursday. A succession of floods is reported above El Reno.

Zoo animals are being moved from Wheeler park to Fair Grounds park. The playground at Wheeler is under eight feet of water.

E. H. Baxter, 718 West Twenty-first street, driving in a Ford, escorting a young woman, was bumped into a ditch on East Twenty-third street by another car, Sunday. The ditch was partly full of water.

Citizens of Nowkirk raided the country club Sunday morning—for boats. The boats were loaded on trucks and hurried to Antwine where ten families were isolated.

Big Jess Willard and Ray Archer struck Oklahoma at the wrong time. The rodeo scheduled in their honor has been called off because of wet grounds at the 101 ranch.

The Polo grounds and the artesian well site at Ponca City have been flooded.

Police department boats and private-owned motorboats were pressed into service along the Arkansas river Sunday. Many were rescued at farm homes and small towns.

One-fifth of the wheat in Kay county was under water at some time or other Sunday, according to estimates by Ponca Cityans.

Thousands of acres have been inundated on the course of the South Canadian, especially in the Bridgeport district.

The poor old Orient that has struggled under receivership for years will need that Santa Rita gusher. The bridge at Canton has been swept away and train service has been halted for three days.

Families in the river bottoms at Oklahoma City were waiting for word that the police will again move them Sunday.

"Our city has suffered more than \$2,000,000 damage and at least 3,000 people are rendered homeless by the disastrous flood which swept over a large portion of the city today, destroying scores of homes and leaving in its wake much suffering," says the mayor of Arkansas City.

A fund of \$500,000 for relief of the destitute homeless has been asked by Arkansas City.

Water of the Chickaskia foaming over the Santa Fe railway over a two and one-half mile stretch, could be heard for a mile or more, rescue workers said.

Boatmen on the Chickaskia reported visiting a farm home isolated by water, could find on one. Rowing up to the door they found a 450-pound hog snoring on a sofa safely above water. The family was upstairs.

The flood struck Antwine without warning. It was a wall of water. A storekeeper fired a gun as warning to the village. Out they came. Before the few residents could reach the grain elevators many were swimming.

Mexican track workers on the Santa Fe line waiting for rescuers on top of the section house at Antwine whiled away their time singing dolorous songs.

Some men are wags even in adversity. Rescue workers on the Salt Fork reported taking a farmer from a tree near the Salt Fork. They were attracted to the spot by his singing. His song was "Throw Out the Life Line."

Wealthy Land Owner Drowned. CLARKSDALE, Miss., June 10.—John Clark Cutler, 50 years old, lawyer and prominent land owner, was drowned Sunday afternoon in Moon lake.

BRIDGE AND TRACK LOSSES RUN HEAVY; GRAIN IS DAMAGED

Rock Island Puts Embargo on Freight to Points West of Geary and North of Caldwell; Frisco Bridge at Mustang Gone; Norman and Union City Spans Left Useless by Change in Channel.

Three thousand persons are homeless and \$2,000,000 property damage has resulted from a flood on the Arkansas river at Arkansas City; damage totaling millions of dollars has been done crops; railway schedules have been disrupted; miles of right-of-way and a score of bridges have been destroyed in the worst flood that has struck northern Oklahoma and southern Kansas in the worst flood season with in memory of oldest inhabitants.

The Rock Island railroad has placed an embargo on freight to points north of Caldwell, Kansas, and west of Geary. The Santa Fe is running from eight to ten hours behind schedule but by detouring twice is still able to get trains through to Kansas City.

No loss of life has been definitely reported although reports from Ponca City early Monday morning said that six persons went down Salt Fork when the bridge over that stream at the 101 ranch went out.

Ten families are reported marooned at Antwine where the tiny Chickaskia has swollen to a stream two miles wide. A family is reported drifting down the river near this point on a hayrack. A report from Ponca City says that the body of a man was seen in the Arkansas river Sunday.

Transcontinental traffic on the Missionary route of the Santa Fe by way of Woodward, Amarillo and Tucumcari has been halted by the loss of a bridge over the North Canadian at Woodward. The traffic is being rerouted.

Trains running between Ft. Worth and Denver on the Ft. Worth and Denver railway have been halted at Tascosa, Texas, where the South Canadian river bridge is out.

The South Canadian bridge at Norman has been damaged. Two steel spans are gone. The approaches on the west side of the stream have been washed out. The stream has changed its course and it will be necessary to rebuild the bridge.

Trains Under Water. More than two miles of the Santa Fe tracks between Blackwell and Ponca City are under water. The right-of-way has been washed out on the Chickaskia. A full crew of workers is at work at the Santa Fe bridge over the Salt Fork, near Marland, dragging debris away from the bridge timbers.

All wagon bridges south, southeast, southwest and west of Lamont on the Salt Fork have been washed out. There have been no trains run into Lamont for two days.

Two wagon bridges on the Arkansas river west of Arkansas City have been washed out and a third is threatened.

Pile Driver Stopped. Work on the span over the Cimarron burned out last week has been halted. The crew of Santa Fe pile-driving workers and bridge machinists has been badly hampered by the flood stage of the river.

The Frisco bridge over the South Canadian near Mustang gave way early Sunday morning. A section 500 feet long in the center of the stream was carried away. The bridge is more than half a mile long. A crew of workers is waiting on each side of the stream waiting for the waters to recede enough to permit operations.

Vernon Line Broken. The Frisco bridge over the Cimarron, between Ames and Okemah, is out. This ties up traffic between Eald, Hobart, Snyder and Vernon, Texas. The line south of the river is still in use and is being utilized between Hobart and Clinton for detouring Rock Island trains to the west that have been rerouted to Hobart by way of Chickasha and Anadarko.

At Bridgeport the tracks of the Rock Island have been washed out. The South Canadian bridge is safe. A pile driver is isolated on a section of track 100 feet long with washouts in either direction. More than fifty miles of Rock Island tracks between Caldwell, Kan., and Wichita is reported inundated.

Telephone Service Hit. Telephone communication with many points in northern Oklahoma has been cut off. Ponca City, Blackwell, Arkansas City and Intermediate

Bridge Useless If River Shifts

Flood currents were reported cutting away the dirt from the south end of the Meridian highway bridge, 200 feet east of the railway bridge and it was feared that falling water would show that this new bridge was standing on a sandbar at the north side of the channel near Union City.

The bridge, built by federal and state aid, and by Canadian and Grady counties, cost \$500,000. Recent floods have left the south end of the bridge 200 feet in the center of the current, while the stream was rapidly cutting away to the south down the Rock Island right-of-way, and piling up sand under the bridge.

points were still out late Sunday night.

The Orient bridge over the North Canadian river at Canton has been washed out. There have been no trains run out of Canton for three days. Telephone communication has been cut off but the telegraph wires are still up.

Hundreds of head of cattle and horses have been drowned. Loss of hogs is also heavy. At Marland the 101 ranch owners are making vigorous efforts to save thousands of head of livestock.

Live Stock Lost. At Antwine all livestock has been reported lost.

One-fifth of the Kay county wheat crop, one of the richest counties in the state has been under water in the past two days.

Santa Fe trains were still traveling south and across the South Canadian river at Purcell Monday morning. The South Canadian was running high and trains were crawling across bridges and along the river bank at the foot of the Purcell bluffs.

Train service on the Santa Fe north through Ponca City and Arkansas City was running three to twelve hours late Sunday night, although still moving trains. The bridge recently burned at Guthrie was forcing a detour by way of Stillwater while a bridge out at Mulvane, Kan., was forcing another detour.

These were the latest reports at the station here Sunday night but there were reports from the northern part of the state that all trains were held up over this line because of a flooded stretch of track, more than two miles in length.

Oklahoma City may expect another flood, with a crest of 14 to 15 feet, according to reports made by the weather bureau following wind from points up the river.

Wall of Water Coming. The North Canadian was falling at Woodward while a big wall of water was somewhere between that point and Canton. The weather bureau reported that Canton would get the crest of the wave sometime late Sunday night or Monday morning, possibly reaching El Reno late Tuesday and Oklahoma City late in the week.

Jefferson, Okla., a town twenty miles north of Eald, which was completely flooded early Sunday, reported as relieved of the flood Sunday night. Water at that point

SERVANT ONLY JILTED LOVER

Philippine Islander Slew Girl He Could Not Win From Her "Angel."

NEW YORK, June 10.—The other lover, the rich man who won and prompted Eligio Lazado, Filipino man servant, to strangle pretty Blossom Martin in a fit of jealousy, suffered his disguise to be ripped away Sunday. He is Benjamin Mandel, son and partner of Israel Mandel, shoe manufacturer, and was said by the district attorney's office to be married and the father of two children.

Everything for Happiness.

Mandel had everything to make a girl happy, it seemed. He established a "love nest" for Miss Martin in West Fifty-seventh street, and when she pouted, he bought a magnificent motor car that she might spin through the city and cheer her drooping spirits. Then fate threw into the path of this shadowland romance, the man servant Lazado, 35 years old, brown almost to black, and unattractive of face. About him there is only youth that could bring back the eyes of women for a second look.

Relations Are Revealed.

He was employed by Dr. George McAuliffe, to whom Blossom Martin was nurse-assistant, and had many chances to press his suit. Lazado bought a diamond ring. Miss Martin is said to have turned up her pretty nose when he tried to give it to her. Friday night she was strangled and Lazado was caught trying to dump her body in the waters of the Kill Von Kull.

Mandel told the district attorney's office Saturday all about his relations with the girl, over two years, but gave a false name. First Harry Berger and later, Mr. Martin. His identity was revealed Sunday, together with many facts about his relations with Miss Martin.

He Feared Complications.

"My wife (Miss Martin) and I are of different religious faiths," he was said to have told acquaintances in explaining why he was absent so much from home. "My father would disinherit me if he knew of the marriage."

Frequently while visiting Miss Martin, Mandel would excuse himself and hurry away ostensibly to his father's home to avoid "complications." Mandel visited Dr. McAuliffe's home recently, it was learned, represented himself as Mr. Martin, and told of Miss Martin's fear of the Filipino.

The last known quarrel between Lazado and Miss Martin took place Thursday night.

Self-Defense Pleaded.

Lazado intimated he would plead self-defense.

GOVERNMENT PLANS REFUNDING OF LOAN

Banks To Be Asked to Take Care of Huge Sum.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The treasury Sunday night announced it would seek a loan of \$150,000,000 to round out its financing for the current fiscal year, ending June 30.

The new certificates of indebtedness will mature in six months and it is expected, will be retired largely by tax receipts in the next two quarters. The interest rate will be 4 percent, slightly lower than previous offerings of government securities have paid.

Refund Short Debt.

The new issue will enable the government to conclude the refunding of its short dated debt, begun in 1921, and no further financing will be necessary, it was stated officially, until the middle of September.

Proceeds of the new certificate offer, which will be dated June 15, together with the June 15 payment of income and profit taxes, expected to amount to \$350,000,000 or more, will take care of certificates of indebtedness maturing on that date and provide for the running expenses of the government until September 15. Maturing certificates must be cared for then and officials expect that some new financing will have to be done at that time.

About \$75,000,000 in interest on the public debt falls due June 15 but that can be met promptly through the tax receipts as can the interest payments due in July and August.

Will Reduce Certificates.

With the treasury carrying a cash balance of close to \$300,000,000, officials declared today the government's financial position was better than the

"BURN THEM," CHURCH MEMBERS LOUDLY CRY

Wave of Indignation Reaches White Heat Sunday.

LOS ANGELES, June 10.—Recent crimes here against women and young girls, resulting a few days ago in the sensational activities of the "White Knights," handed to take the law in their own hands, found an echo Sunday night in a big mass meeting under church auspices at which Trinity church resounded with cries from the congregation of "Burn 'em!" "Burn 'em!"

The gathering, called on the crest of the wave of public indignation, which has broken over the Los Angeles police department for its alleged laxity in letting go uncaught the criminals complained of, was charged with quivering interest, which was intensified when the Rev. Gustav A. Briegleb, one of the most prominent clergymen in the city said:

"If I had a daughter, and if such a hideous fate should overtake her as did that of Astrea Jolley, there would be no stake in the country big enough at which to burn these men."

His reference was to the most flagrant of the complained-of cases here in connection with which four youths are either in custody or at liberty on nominal bail, while two others are sought as also being this 14-year-old girl's attackers.

COMMERCIAL FLYING BILL TO BE REVIVED

Bureau of Aeronautic's Will Give It Support.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—When the Winslow bill for the development of commercial aviation in the United States is resurrected in the Sixty-eighth congress it will be enthusiastically endorsed by the bureau of aeronautics of the navy department.

Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, head of the bureau, regards commercial aviation as important an adjunct to naval aeronautics and national defense as the merchant marine is to the navy. He and his aides will lend the bill every assistance at their command, and call upon the friends of the game to do likewise.

TWO ARE SLAIN IN FIGHT AT ROAD HOUSE

Patrolman and Merchant Die At Hands of Gang.

(By the Associated Press.)
ST. LOUIS, June 10.—Patrolman Edward Griffen and John L. Sargent, produce merchant, were killed early Sunday in St. Louis county. Police believe the men were slain by a band of gangsters, which held up several road houses.

All available policemen and detectives are searching the city for the slayers. A young woman also is being sought in connection with double killing.

Officer Griffen, who was in uniform but off duty at a resort, was shot to death before he could pull his revolver from its holster when the gangsters attempted to hold up the place. The officer was shot in the neck, head and heart, and the robbers fled with his revolver.

Forced to Give Car.

Police, who said Sargent probably was passing the road house as the gangsters were fleeing, expressed the opinion that he was forced to take several of the gangsters into his automobile. Shortly afterward, Sargent was found lying unconscious with a bullet hole in his body on a sidewalk, where he apparently had been thrown from the car. He died at a hospital.
