Ike Picks Anderson For Treasury Chief

WASHINGTON, MAY 29 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury George Humphrey, the most powerful man in the Eisenhower cabinet, Wednesday handed in his resignation after four years and four months directing the nation's fiscal policies. President Eisenhower accepted the long-expected resignation with profound regret. He immediately nominated Robert B. Anderson, former deputy secretary of defense, as Humphrey's successor.

Oil Allowable Cut 20 Percent

The state corporation commission approved the recommendation its conservation director to make a 20 percent "across the board" reduction in production allowable for June in Oklahoma. The minimum well allowable will be cut from 25 to 20 barrels of oil a day.

Announcement was made late Thursday by Ray Jones, commission chairman, who said semi-annual production tests for wells in unlocated fields would be taken during the month of June to become effective July 1. The commission will mail necessary forms to operators immediately, he said. The state's new allowable means a slash to 598,000 barrels of oil a day, based on production estimates for May. The May figure was 628,000 barrels a day which means a 30,000 barrel daily reduction for June.

Production will amount to 272,000 barrels a day from the state's unlocated pools, as compared with 1,634 barrels for May; with unlocated fields contributing 326,000 barrels, compared with 338,365 barrels in May.

Flooding Eases As Sun Returns

Threatened rains and thunderstorms returned to parts of Oklahoma Wednesday night, but most of the state enjoyed fair weather and forecasters promised a clear but hot holiday.

Outlook for the Memorial day holiday was for fair skies Thursday morning, becoming partly cloudy during the afternoon with widely scattered thundershowers in western Oklahoma Thursday afternoon and night. Temperatures will be slightly warmer than Wednesday's, ranging from 85 to 95. Oklahoma City is due a high of 88.

Oklahoma's flood situation was easing still more Wednesday, although Moffett remained under three to four feet of Arkansas river water. During the afternoon, the Arkansas cut off the U. S. 62 detour, leaving the eastern Oklahoma border town completely isolated. All 400 residents were evacuated several days ago, however.

Lake Texoma was still pouring 5,500 cubic feet of water over its spillway every second. As downstream flood conditions eased, additional floodgates and power gates were opened to discharge a total of 37,500 cubic feet a second from the swollen reservoir, but inflow was still 52,600 cfs.

Two Denison, Texas, industries forced to evacuate their plants — Yellow Jacket Boat Co. Inc., and the Theakston Corp. — announced Wednesday they would move back and resume regular operation Monday.

Information Agency Pinched

WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—The senate, after hearing charges that U. S. information agency practices could lead to a "government-kept" press, Wednesday passed and sent to the White House a bill making sharp cuts in the agency's 1958 budget. Debate centered on USIA's practice of buying special articles from American newsmen—a practice which senate Democratic leader Lyndon Johnson of Texas called an effort to "reach into the nation's editorial process."

But Sen. Neuberger (D., Ore.) said he did not believe payments of \$80, \$100 or even \$400 for an article would "contaminate" a newsman's viewpoint. The compromise appropriations bill was passed on a 74-2 roll call vote. Only Sens. Neuberger and Javits (R., N. Y.), supporters of USIA, voted against it. The house passed the bill by voice vote earlier Wednesday.

The legislature wound up nearly five months of work by enacting virtually the complete program recommended by Gov. Gary. The governor said after the close that the legislature had passed every single bill he had requested.

Spending Sets Record

The legislature set a new spending record by appropriating \$195 million and wound up with an estimated \$20,000 left over. The \$25 million boost in the budget over two years ago was made possible by increased tax collections the past two years.

The legislature would have financed the budget without any new taxes, except for the terrific damages to roads and highways the past few weeks.

The only tax increase was the temporary 1-cent gasoline tax boost to repair the flood damages. The tax will expire next December 31, but the governor was authorized to end the tax before then if sufficient revenues are collected to repair the damages.

The legislature passed three major election reform bills, boosted teacher salaries and provided for consolidation of about 200 school districts.

Local Bills Mar Record

It set up a new constitutional wildlife conservation commission, providing for abolishing the state fire marshal's office Jan. 1, 1959, enacted a new insurance code, and generally increased appropriations for all functions of government.

Probably the worst blot on the legislative record was the passage of around 200 local bills raising county officer salaries and travel pay. Most legislators agreed the bills were unconstitutional.

The legislature refused to take any note of criticism leveled at county commissioner spending of highway funds allocated by the state. Power of the county commissioner bloc appears to be growing stronger in each session of the legislature. It probably will take forceful action of some future governor to break the commissioners' grip on legislators.
